

Plagiarism



Students enrolled at Oxford must exhibit the highest standards of academic integrity and not knowingly submit any work or intellectual ideas that have been adapted from or copied from a third-party source without appropriate recognition.

Oxford University imposes severe sanctions for cases of plagiarism. In the most extreme case, a student will be judged to have failed the course.

These regulations are imposed by the University and if a student is suspected of plagiarism the matter is likely to pass to the Proctors who will rule on the matter independently of the OUCE.

Plagiarism



All assessed work you submit should be new and original writing conducted during your relevant terms in Oxford. It is not acceptable to re-package essays presented for degrees elsewhere (i.e. self-plagiarism).

The University Student Handbook 2015/16 (Incorporating the Proctor's and Assessor's Memorandum) states on p33
“...material you have previously submitted for examination, at this University or elsewhere, cannot be re-used unless specifically permitted in the special Subject Regulations”

Avoiding Plagiarism




"... You must always indicate to the examiners when you have drawn on the work of others; other people's original ideas and methods should be clearly distinguished from your own, and other people's words, illustrations, diagrams etc. should be clearly indicated regardless of whether they are copied exactly, paraphrased, or adapted..."

...The University reserves the right to use software applications to screen any individual's submitted work for matches either to published sources or to other submitted work. Any such matches respectively might indicate either plagiarism or collusion...

...Although the use of electronic resources by students in their academic work is encouraged, you should remember that the regulations on plagiarism apply to on-line material and other digital material just as much as to printed material..."

Citing your references



Just a few of the more common points

- An article in an online journal which also exists in print should be cited in the same way as print.
- To cite something which only exists electronically, e.g. a web site, follow special rules *which include the date viewed*.
- A specific quote must include the page reference in the citation. (This also applies to tables & diagrams you have taken directly from another source.)

Using quotations

- A specific quote must include the page reference in the in text citation.
- They must also be enclosed by quotation marks.
- If you don't then TURNITIN software will ping it back as plagiarism, even if you have given the full reference.
- THAT means straight to the Proctors – a whole load of hassle and a £50 fine!!!



What is reference management software?

Reference management software, also known as citation management software, allows you to:

- collect references
- store references in a web account or on your desktop
- organise references
- add notes to your references
- link to full text, web pages and documents
- cite your references and create bibliographies

Some also have additional features such as:

- sharing your references
- pdf highlighting
- collaboration
- social networking

Choosing your reference management software

For a comparison the pros and cons and of the features of some of the most common reference managers see the comparison table tab. For more detailed information about these reference managers - including sources of help and training - refer to their individual tabs.

You may also find it helpful to test different reference managers to see which one you prefer working with. Particular things you will want to consider when choosing your reference manager are:

1. Accessibility - desktop, web-based or web browser extension
2. Is the citation / reference style you need to use available?
3. Is the software compatible with the word processor you use?
4. If you want to share your references with colleagues, what do they use?

RefWorks - Personal Bibliographic Management Software

RefWorks is an online research management, writing and collaboration tool, designed to help researchers easily gather, manage, store and share all types of information, as well as generate citations and bibliographies. The Bodleian Libraries has taken out a subscription so any *bona fide* member of the University may freely create an account.

Once logged on, there are many tutorials and information resources to help you work successfully.

If you want to access your account from outside the Oxford domain, you will need to input the Oxford "Group Code" before being presented with the RefWorks login page. You can access the Group Code here using your Oxford University SSO username and password.

Note that we are subscribing to RefWorks: Scopus Edition. This provides an exceptional degree of integration between the two products. [Read an overview of what is possible](#).

Alumni access

Our RefWorks licence allows for lifetime use by Oxford University alumni (as long as we continue our subscription). If you wish to access your RefWorks account away from Oxford after you graduate you can make a note of the Group Code mentioned above by using your Oxford Single Sign On username and password before you leave.



What Is RefWorks?

RefWorks is a web-based bibliography and database manager that allows you to create your own personal database by importing references from text files or online databases and other various sources. You can use these references in writing papers and automatically format the paper and the bibliography in seconds.

Before we even get into all the things you can do with RefWorks -- we want to let you know that we have a variety of resources available to help you -- should you need it:

RefWorks User Support includes:

- **Online Help** (what you're accessing right now) -- the Online Help file has a wealth of information that you can search or navigate through from the table of contents. Whenever you see text in blue -- that's a hotspot and you can click on it to open additional information below the hotspot. To print a topic, right click on the topic page in the Table of Contents and select Print Target or click on the topic itself and user your browser print icon.
- **Tutorials (Fundamentals, Advanced and RefShare)** -- these tutorials are self-paced so you can pause, rewind, fast forward and pick and choose which modules of information you're most interested in. You can access the tutorials from within your RefWorks account, or by [clicking here](#).
- **Quick Start Guides** -- these handy printouts come in a variety of languages and are a good overview and reminder of how to perform certain functions and features in RefWorks. Quick Start Guides can be accessed from the Tools area in your account, or by [clicking here](#).
- **Training Webinars** -- live webinars offered monthly, as well as recorded webinars to review at your own pace.

- Deleted references no longer download to your local database
- When Auto Sync option is selected, it remains selected unless de-selected by user
- Documents with citations inserted using One Line Cite View (RefWorks users only) will automatically be converted for use with PQFW 4 and above
- Folder names with Asian characters now sync correctly
- Paragraph spacing will no longer be changed when using a style that contains stylized text such as italic, bold, etc.
- Extra spaces appearing in text citations after formatting papers
- MLA title casing issue
- MLA bibliography sorting issue
- MLA footnote citation issue
- Appending of alphabetic characters in the cases of ambiguous in text citations
- Erroneous HTML coding showing in text citations: (Gelormino & Ricker 1994)
- Footnote citation editing issue
- Issue with citing 3 in text citations on one line

Google Scholar

- Allows you to search for academic literature on the web
- Limited functionality
- Not focused on science
- Doesn't cover everything!
- A proper bibliographic database **WILL** serve you better

Databases vs. Search engines

- Contents are indexed by subject specialists
- Subject headings
- Limiting functions e.g. publication types, language

Allow you to

- View Search history
- Combine searches
- Mark and sort results
- Print/save/email/export
- Save searches
- Set up alerts

- Searches done by automated “web crawlers”
- No thesaurus / subject headings – just free text searching
- No limiting functions
- Usually none of these!

Abstract

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The geological stability and existence of low-lying atoll nations is threatened by sea-level rise and climate change. Funafuti Atoll, in the tropical Pacific Ocean, has experienced some of the highest rates of sea-level rise ($\sim 5.1 \pm 0.7$ mm/yr), totaling $\sim 0.30 \pm 0.04$ m over the past 60 yr.
