Job description

Overview of the role

We have made improvements to the libraries and library services over the past few years, but despite this there are some groups of students who have told us that they have not felt the benefits as much as others. We are trying to achieve a deeper understanding of the needs of these groups with a series of projects over the coming years.

For this project, we are looking to employ 6 Student Fellows. You will need to be a full-time taught Master's student at the University of Oxford during the 2025/26 academic year.



Using a methodology called “co-design”, you will work as a team with library staff to explore your library needs and any barriers you face, generate solutions, and then pilot and evaluate changes to improve our libraries and/or services for you and others. Co-design is a new methodology for the Bodleian Libraries that we are trying out in a series of experimental projects. It is an innovative process that brings together lived experience and professional expertise in equal partnership to enact relevant and effective change. The library staff involved are people with the power to make changes and try things out, and are enthusiastic to be involved. The project will be supported by the User Experience Librarian, a member of the Assessment Team.

The co-design methodology means that the team, facilitated by the User Experience Librarian, works together to design and determine the shape of the project. Therefore, we do not know at this point what the project will look like, and cannot predict what exactly it will involve. There are some parameters in place – the project must be finished within 11 months, and we are expecting the Student Fellows to work a minimum of 24 hours over the time period, with an upper limit of 48 hours.

The content of the first 3 sessions is outlined below. These will take place in person within the first half of Michaelmas Term. Beyond this, the direction will be decided collectively by the team.

Session 1:

- Introductions
- Background to the project
- Overview of co-design
- What do we mean by library services?
- Agree ground rules and expectations
- Agree the rough shape of the project
- Assignment details: ‘What is it like to be me?’ A getting-to-know each other assignment with prompt questions to answer in a format that suits you (e.g. in photos, writing, PowerPoint, or video etc.) to be completed before Session 2

Session 2:

- Share the “What is it like to be me?” assignments with the whole group

Session 3:

- Reflect on the “What is it like to be me?” assignments to draw out similar and unique experiences
- Activity: “Get it off your chest!” What would you most like to change about the libraries?
- Check back on the agreed shape of the project and make changes if necessary

Benefits

- The Student Fellow role is paid employment that fits around your studies. The hourly rate is at the Oxford Living Wage (currently £13.37 per hour)
- This is an opportunity to make concrete positive changes to libraries and library services that benefit you and others
- You will be employed by the Bodleian Libraries, and we can provide a reference for you in the future
- You will be able to utilise your lived experience, skills and creativity

What you will do

- Attend regular meetings in person
- Work with fellow students and library staff in the project team

- The project team will collectively, with the support of a facilitator, decide the structure, organisation, area of focus, methodology, evaluation and other aspects of the design of the project.
- Reflect on your lived experiences and feelings as a taught Master's student studying at Oxford and using the libraries and library services. Communicate these experiences to other project members
- As a team, design improvements to libraries and/or library services
- Prototype these improvements with the other project members by making basic models of their design and functionality
- Test and evaluate how well the prototypes work, and refine them together with the rest of the team
- Reflect on your own learnings during the project

Other duties

- Undertake any necessary training identified
- Comply with health and safety regulations
- Complete timesheets by a monthly deadline

1. Ability to work collaboratively with others towards achieving a shared goal.
2. Experience of putting plans into action to solve problems

3. Reliably attend in-person meetings punctually, consistently deliver commitments, and experience in meeting deadlines
4. Committed for whole time period
5. Ability to reflect on and communicate own experiences to others

Desirable selection criteria

1. Experience of developing an idea into a concrete service or product (e.g. Young Enterprise at school, design GCSE/A-Level, something from your first degree)
2. Ability to create something new, whether a new solution to a problem, a new method or device, or a new artistic object or form
